several new team members. All with the Holy Spirit guiding us.






Our education and music ministries continue to thrive. I am proud of how much missional support our congregation does in the world in so many ways. BHPC partners with Bethesda Jewish Congregation and Maqaam e Ibrahim Islamic Center in our building, cares for around 170 children in our nursery school, and provides space and a supportive environment to pastoral counselors, local concerts and board meetings, our phenomenal Friends Club, and programs for young adults with developmental differences. Hosting many community programs requires more staff time and puts more wear on our facility than if we didn't share our building with many others. While some of the building users bring in helpful income, our church facility provides significant missional support to these and other mission partners.

It was wonderful to see such strong in-person worship attendance return for Christmas Eve this year. Seeing the kids dressed as sheep and shepherds struggling to find room on the chancel because there were so many was a good challenge to have.

We set new records for dollars brought in this past year and for pledged dollars for 2024. BHPC begins the new year with momentum, optimism and with Hallelujah in our hearts.

Sitting with many of you in counseling sessions, small group devotions, regular conversations at the doors after worship and sharing the weekly graces you lifted up, helps me recall how blessed I am to be in ministry with you. You will find many examples of activities of the church in these pages to follow that may remind you of your own memories.

I am excited for our future together, and appreciative of your support for our shared journey.



I firmly believe that in the world we live in, especially in the year we as a country are entering, with all the issues we face, that a church like Bradley Hills is more important than ever. In January 2023, I had the opportunity to visit my family in California. While I was there, I worshiped with my "home" church on Epiphany Sunday and was introduced to the tradition of picking a "star" word. The pastor challenged us to keep the first word we picked—rather than shuffle through the basket for something to our liking. Printed in capital letters on the yellow star I picked from the basket was the word *RESILIENCE*.

I think of resilience as the ability to weather adversity—to learn and grow through life's experiences and challenges. We are able to develop resilience in spaces that provide the

resources, relationships, and meaningful experiences that help us gain the skills and self-assurance to face what comes

our way.

Resources: On a weekly basis, worship at BHPC provides sanctuary not just for our bodies, but also our souls through music, prayer, and the Word read and preached. In our discussions of prayer during the Lenten Small Groups we examined how we are co-creators with God and that through our prayers "God works with the world as it is to bring it toward what it can be" (Marjorie Suchocki). During our Fall Small Groups, our interfaith conversations on Christianity, Judaism, Islam, and Buddhism were timely as we faced the outbreak of war in the Middle East. The Susan Andrew's Lecture "Sacred Mysteries of the Labyrinth" invited us understand how the labyrinth can be a beneficial spiritual practice.

Relationships: Care and connection continue to be an important part of the pastoral care ministries at BHPC. BHPC is a large congregation that has a small church feel because of the genuine efforts of the Deacons to connect with members, support opportunities for






Team continued to provide caring support, Christian fellowship, and a nurturing relationship to those in need. We also had the first meeting of our new Grief Support Group in December. If you do not know who your Deacon is, would like information about receiving a visit from a member of the Visiting Team, or would like to join the Grief Support Group please contact me.

<u>Experiences</u>: Meaningful experiences with people within the BHPC community can help build resilience by fostering a sense of belonging because we feel welcomed, we are nurtured, and we are cared for as we grow spiritually and develop in our faith formation.

Meaningful experiences with others in the broader community help build resilience by allowing us to find shared purpose in service to make the world a better place. Through Mission Connection Lay Ministry, we had both financial and hands-on mission opportunities, including our partnership with Faith Presbyterian Church. Through the Racial Justice Coordinating Committee we provided financial support to restore the historic Scotland Zion AME Church and participated on the Juneteenth Interfaith Committee and volunteered at the Juneteenth Celebration. Lastly, one of the most rewarding experiences that I had was accompanying our middle school youth to Massanetta for their summer conference where they participated in mission projects, experienced energized worship, dialogued with other youth about living their faith and had fun.

It has been my blessing to serve as your Associate Pastor—to share this journey with you in times of challenge as well as times of celebration. I have come to think of resilience as another word for faith—or perhaps it's that our faith allows us to be resilient. By God's grace, and through faith we remained resilient in 2023. As we look toward 2024 together, "let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up."

Annual Report of the Session



Welcome Back Brunch 2023

In July of 2023, Session received and accepted the final report of the Strategic Visioning Task Force (SVTF). The task force's report identified five areas to which the church should give its attention: 1) Connecting, strengthening connectional relationships within the congregation and surrounding communities; 2) Celebrating, celebrating in gratitude for God's grace and love and glorify God through joyful worship on Sundays where all are welcome; 3) **Nurturing**, providing more Christian education programs and spiritual growth opportunities with a focus on joy and engagement; 4) Serving, giving glory to God through Christian ministry and interfaith programs; and 5) Stewarding,

caring for God's creation. Session asked each of the lay ministries to review the SVTF report and to consider how each of them might taking action to implement the report's recommendations. We continue to work with the lay ministries to find ways in which the BHPC community can take the actions necessary to move in the directions the SVTF has pointed us.

Session recently reviewed proposed revisions to the bylaws of the Bradley Hills Nursery School. Session reviewed a draft of the proposed bylaws and made recommendations on issues that needed to be addressed before the finalization of the new bylaws.

Worship Workshop

BHPC continued to see changes in the church staff in 2023. In the late winter of 2023, we said 🌉 goodbye to our long-time church treasurer Amy de Court and welcomed new treasurer Jan Spencer, who guickly took over the reins of that position. Session approved a position description for an interim music director who would fill in for Matthew when he was away on new-parent leave. Session then approved the hiring of Brenda Weiser for the interim position; and Brenda has done a wonderful job of leading our music program since November and will continue in the position until Matthew returns in February. Finally, in January of 2024, our newly-ordained Director of Christian

Education (DCE) Matt Nabinger advised us that he had accepted a call to be the Pastor of Oaklands Presbyterian Church in Laurel, Md. Matt's seven-year ministry at BHPC was celebrated in worship on January 21, Parents & 2nd Graders at 2024. He is beloved by all of the members of the congregation, especially by the youth, and we wish him the very best in his new ministry. Session

approved a position description for an interim DCE and then approved the hiring of BHPC member Rosanna Howard to fill the position. Rosanna will occupy the position while the church conducts a search for a permanent DCE.

Under the leadership of Pastor Diaab, in 2023 members of Session joined with the deacons to serve home communion to BHPC congregants who are unable to be at worship. All of the elders who have participated in home communion find the

experience to be very meaningful. Other actions taken by Session in 2023 included adopting a sexual misconduct policy, as required by National Capital Presbytery, and providing that we have uniformed security personnel at our worship services. After the attack on Israel by Hamas on October 7, Session sent a letter to our partners at Bethesda Jewish Congregation giving our condolences for the loss of Israeli lives and the taking of hostages and expressing our hope for future peace in the region.

Our congregation continues to grow; at the end of 2022 we had 625 active members, and that number rose to 649 at the end of 2023.

Personnel Lay Ministry



The Personnel Lay Ministry (PLM) supports all aspects of personnel management at BHPC, including organizing job descriptions of all positions, organizing search committees when positions become vacant, celebrating and recognizing the church's staff, and gathering information for annual performance reviews.

2023 was a year of celebrations and transitions for some of our staff, and PLM organized recognitions and supported those transitions. PLM planned and led the church's celebration, in March 2023, of Amy DeCourt's lengthy and devoted service following her retirement as BHPC's financial manager. We also welcomed Jan Spencer early in 2023 as our new Director of Financial Ministries.

In October, we celebrated Matt Nabinger's ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. PLM's chair

extends thanks to the leaders of Children's Lay Ministry, the Youth Lay Ministry, and many others for their partnership and support in planning the reception which followed Matt's ordination service.

PLM also worked with David Gray and Matthew Robertson to plan for the arrival in November of Matthew's first child. These efforts included, as part of leave planning, identifying and engaging a temporary Director of Music Ministries. Brenda Weiser joined us in that position in December 2023.

In response to the Strategic Visioning Task Force report, PLM also began conversations with Denise Diaab and David Gray to discuss administrative tasks as a component of their overall duties as Pastor and Associate Pastor.

PLM's work in 2023 also included several recurring activities: (1) proposing terms of call for BHPC's Pastor and Associate Pastor for approval at the 2023 congregation annual meeting; (2) supporting the renewal of BHPC's Pastoral Associate relationship with Jong Mi Lee; and (3) preparing a recommended staff budget and COLA for 2024, after considering current and staffing needs and several inflation benchmarks.

PLM also led the information-gathering for annual staff performance reviews. As in 2021 and 2022, with many lay ministries continuing to meet remotely in 2023. PLM relied on email and scheduled phone conferences with staff and lay ministries in addition to in-person meetings with some lay ministries. After information-gathering, PLM consulted with David Gray as head of staff ahead of his individual meetings with members of the staff for annual reviews.

PLM also thanked Judy Webster for her service on PLM as she concluded her service in June 2023. PLM welcomed Rob Rennhack as a new member of our lay ministry in Staff Holiday Party with BJC, BHPC Fall of 2023.

Financial Lay Ministry

The Financial Lay Ministry oversees the development and management of our annual budgets, manages the church's investments, coordinates the church's special offerings and other fundraising appeals, and supports the efforts of the Stewardship Lay Ministry.

2023 was a strong year financially for Bradley Hills, thanks to the contributions of our members and staff. Our church leadership and staff found ways to sustain and enhance programs and missions while closely managing financial resources. Thank you to our many members who demonstrated faithful giving throughout 2023.

SOURCES of INCOME for OPERATIONS

Individual gifts:

- Pledged income in 2023, our primary income source, totaled \$1,103,924, which was 1.5% above budget.
- Unpledged income totaled \$131,202 this past year, well over the \$95,000 that was budgeted.

Building Users:

- Bradley Hills Nursery School made building use contributions totaling \$166,282.
- Bethesda Jewish Congregation continued making its building use contribution totaling \$92,498.
- Total building use income reached \$274,882 as outside building users continued to return post-pandemic.

Investment/Other Income:

 While our endowment proceeds were relatively flat to 2022 levels, we restructured and consolidated some of our local banking relationships, significantly improving interest rates. Investment/other income was \$32,312 ahead of budget.

Total Revenues:

• Total revenues in 2023 were \$1,575,402, which was \$88,387 over the amount budgeted.

USES of FUNDS for OPERATIONS

Staff Compensation & Benefits:

• Staff compensation and expenses totaled \$1,006,677 which was right at budget.

Programs, Missions, and All Other Expenditures:

• Use of funds for programs, missions, and non-program expenses were \$418,739, the largest portions of which were Property Management of \$192,799 and Mission Coordination of \$96,279.

Special Obligations:

- Special obligations include the annual apportionment payment of \$31,907 to National Capital Presbytery (\$30,350 for 2024).
- The Operating budget contributed \$50,000 toward funding capital reserves which was nearly double that of the prior year, but less than the \$125,000 that should be set aside annually.

Again this year the BHPC congregation responded generously to the pledge campaign. Stewardship pledges for 2024 set another new record: 195 pledges totaling \$1,113,085, including 21 commitments from first-time pledgers and more "new" dollars than we've had in many years. The average amount pledged was 3.4% higher than the year before. Thanks to everyone who pledged!

The SLM's purpose is to "... focus on year-round stewardship communication and education while highlighting the spiritual nature of giving to the church."

This ministry supports church growth by (a) reaching out to the community and encouraging people to visit, (b) supporting the congregation in identifying and welcoming visitors, and (c) connecting new and potential members to ministry opportunities, (d) and cross ministry collaboration for effective membership outreach and engagement.

Despite the continued impact of the pandemic, we had 24 adult new members join BHPC in 2023 and we finished 2023 with 649 adult active members, 28 active non-members and 288 inactive members.

Welcoming Visitors, New Members, and Building Connections: As we've welcomed our church family back into the building (as well as continued to engage with new and current members online) we were ready to meet people where they are

with Welcome Kits, personal phone calls and notes from David, outreach emails, and warm greetings on Sundays.

<u>Our BHPC Website</u>: Maintaining and enhancing our website is critical to our outreach activities. We are undertaking an update to the website to reflect our dynamic and welcoming faith community. In recent years we have linked our website to advertising campaigns on social media and this tool has been effective for pushing targeted efforts to recruited new members.

Reaching & Driving Social Media Expansion: We have continued to find ways to expand our use of social media for advertising and actively post upcoming activities, post-activity recaps, and other announcements of general interest. Utilizing mainly Facebook has allowed for direct advertisement campaigns targeting the specific audience when appropriate and for objective statistics to tell us who is viewing our advertisements. Building on our experience from prior years we have been better able to target advertisements to specific audiences.

Adult Education Lay Ministry

Throughout 2023 Adult Education Lay Ministry programs on Sunday morning served as a keystone of community faith development and outreach. As pandemic challenges eased, live attendance increased as we moved back into the lounge. Technology allowed us to simultaneously provide Zoom presentations for members across the country. These programs provided opportunities for members to

Explore Our Faith - in depth studies of Biblical passages provided by pastors, adult education leaders and scholars including Reverend Shively Smith and Dr. Denise Dombkowski Hopkins. Dr. Bruce Douglass led a three-week study on the impact of Reformed faith on nationalism, revolution and democracy.

- Live Our Faith recognized leaders, many of whom are Bradley Hills members, shared their experiences locally and globally to address poverty, economic and racial injustice, environmental stewardship, as well as the challenges and opportunities presented by social media and artificial intelligence.
- Support Our Faith presentations by the BHPC Strategic Visioning Task Force (STVTF), the Racial Justice Coordinating Committee (RJCC), Jimmie Hawkins from the Presbyterian Office of Social Witness and BHPC mission projects revealed multiple opportunities for discipleship.

Adult Education has sought to coordinate and partner with ministries, groups, and activities that enliven the church community. We planned closely with pastor Denise Diaab to provide sessions that led into and brought together issues and ideas for small group discussion. Denise provided an introductory session on Prayer and, at the conclusion of sessions on the book, *The Elephant is Running*, author Bruce Epperly discussed the importance of this multi-faith study. When the RJCC planned a field trip to visit the Josiah Henson Museum, adult education arranged a session with Jamie Ferguson Kuhns, author of Josiah Henson's biography, to provide context for the trip.

Adult Education facilitated a session for members to learn about the rationale for the Strategic Visioning Task Force Report as the Session began to work on its implementation. We have agreed to collaborate in planning future Susan Andrews lectures and look forward to the Robert P. Jones address on February 18 on his book The Hidden Roots of White Supremacy with the help of the Racial Justice Coordinating Committee. The lay ministry has also agreed to contribute financially to the Reformed Institute of the Greater Washington Area in recognition of the stellar annual programs presented by Bruce Douglass. Future program development will include enhancing faith development across generations.

Deacon's Report

There are varieties of gifts, but it is the same Spirit who gives them. There are different ways of serving God, but it is the same Lord who is served. God works through each person in a unique way, but it is God's purpose that is accomplished. To each is given a gift of the Spirit to be used for the common good. Together we are the body of Christ, and individually members of it.

(1 Corinthians 12:4-7, 27)

Our mission is to "...be a bridge between the Holy and the people; to listen, identify and respond to those in need, to model God's compassion and hospitality; to partner with the staff and fellow Deacons in caring for one another, serving with imagination and gladness." And we served in spirit and alignment with 1 Corinthians and BHPC's Strategic Vision Task Force goals.

Connect

Deacons organized our annual fellowship events - Easter Sunday Coffee Fellowship, Welcome Back Brunch, and Veterans' Coffee Hour - in honor of our congregation and veterans. And we hosted receptions after attending Blue Christmas services with our congregation.

We connected in various ways, especially with those experiencing sickness, loss, sadness, or other challenges and limitations. Communion was served monthly in homes and to sextons, teachers, and caregivers, and grace was delivered weekly through flowers. Parishioners were driven to and from worship and medical appointments, and meals were delivered to those needing comfort. We hosted memorial receptions and served as ushers and pallbearers compassionately for many of our beloved church families.

Deacons organized, collaborated, or participated on many inclusive ministries and projects. Childrens Ministry helped us decorate the Easter Sunday Coffee Fellowship. And Deacons individually served with Inter-Congregational Partnership Committee (ICPC), Youth, Childrens, Personnel, Outreach, Worship & Arts, and Session ministries on the Interfaith Brunch, Nabinger Ordination Reception, Youth Mission trip, Communion, Father's Day Sunday Coffee Fellowship, Safety & Security, and Hymnals-to-Virtual-Worshipers.

And we connected with our congregation through visits, calls, cards, letters, emails, Deacons' Corners, and as Deacon of the Week greeters.

Deacons invested funds to establish a dedicated Grief Ministry program at Bradley Hills, and some are in training to become facilitators.

We used environmentally friendly dishware, glassware and silverware for our events and invested in new, reusable supplies to enhance our receptions.

Worship & Arts Lay Ministry

The Worship & Arts Lay Ministry supports the ministry staff in offering meaningful ways to enhance our worship experience. Over the course of the past year, we have embraced familiar and diverse traditions that bring us together in the sanctuary. Overall worship attendance continued a healthy rebound, as staff sought to build out our worship programs this year with hopes of excellence, participation, meaning and joy. We were able to have a variety of congregational voices present in liturgy, music, scripture and prayers more than we have had since covid began. We continued to build our on-line community globally, while seeing increased in person attendance. In May 2023 we welcomed a "Tricaster" upgrade to the livestream portion of our A V system, shifting from vimeo to youtube and creating a more reliable livestream option.

Meaningful messages and purposeful prayers engaged the congregation. When the weather was nice we held 8:30 worship outside at the cross. As the year neared its close, over 900 people took part in our three Christmas Eve worship services, a significant increase over 2022 and a hopeful sign of renewal in our worship community. We enjoyed having a full house of children during our Christmas pageant, and look forward to the new year.

A special project in 2023 enhanced outreach to online worshipers by offering to send hymnals to people who attend Sunday services remotely. Through collaboration among the Deacons, the Outreach Lay Ministry, and Matthew Robertson – with special thanks to Cliff Ty, Scott Williams, Corky Hickey and Joel Fickett, the church was able to provide 15 hymnals to members of our church family and also obtained a supply to offer in the future.

Music Ministry

Matthew Robertson brought musical excellence and fresh ideas to the 2023 music program, upholding the church's commitment to high quality music while showcasing varied musical traditions, including choral works by diverse contemporary composers. During Matthew's parental leave at the end of 2023, we were pleased to welcome Brenda Weiser to the position of Temporary Director of Music Ministry. On multiple occasions, Annabelle Hunter offered her considerable musical gifts as organist and pianist; Bill Perry performed original songs to enhance our worship.

We are grateful for the dedication of the volunteers who participated in our many music programs this year and encourage all who are interested in contributing musically to the church to consider sharing their gifts in this way. The Chancel Choir continued to grow back slowly, with our talented section leaders serving as essential anchors for music on Sundays. In fall 2023, we welcomed Solomon Collins, an early-career bass baritone currently completing his degree in vocal performance at the University of Maryland, to the Chancel Choir as the Sutherland Choral Scholar for the 2023-24 program year. (The Choral Scholar program is made possible through the Donald S. Sutherland Endowment, which extends the church's mission of music in the community above and beyond regular programs.)

The children's choirs, Lantern Chorale and Alleluia Singers, also brought their special gifts to worship services, as did the Bradley Ringers, our bell choir. Rosanna Howard began a cherub choir for our youngest singers this past fall. The Intergenerational Choir extended the variety of opportunities to sing in church. Participation involved a single rehearsal on Sunday morning and gave new and different people a chance to come together to make music for worship during the summer months.

Many special musical occasions took place at BHPC in 2023. Highlights included an inspiring week with renowned choral director, Brandon Waddles, leading the choir and congregation in music during a summer residency. (This was also thanks to the generosity of the Donald S. Sutherland Endowment.) During Holy Week, Matthew led our chancel choir and a chamber orchestra in a special Good Friday offering of Gabriel Fauré's Requiem, and for All Saints Sunday, Matthew led the choir in special music. Both Easter and Christmas Eve featured the joyful sounds of an excellent brass guintet.

Friends of Music

Friends of Music, a subcommittee of Worship and Arts, offered five "Bradley Hills Presents" concerts to the broader community, including well known groups like The Yale Whiffenpoofs. The mission of Friends of Music is to bring joy through the unique language of music. BHPC Friends of Music/Bradley Hills Presents launched a new 2023-24 season in October with two concerts (pianist Véronique Gobet and The American Spiritual Ensemble). Two more concerts are planned for spring 2024, including an appearance by the popular Yale Whiffenpoofs (who also sang in the series in 2023). This concert series continues to provide important outreach and ministry to the broader local community through compelling musical offerings that convey the church's celebration of musical excellence.

Chancel Players

The Chancel Players, Bradley Hills' drama troupe, was founded over 20 years ago by Andy Wolvin, Professor Emeritus, Communication, University of Maryland. Since then the Players and the congregation have been inspired by Andy's creative, kind and thoughtful guidance and theater expertise, from the very first production of a scene from Thornton Wilder's "Our Town," to the many scripture readings, storytellings, monologues and skits that have supported Bradley Hills' worship services. This past year Andy decided to step down as Director of the Chancel Players, with Bill Perry assuming that role going forward. The Players are extremely grateful to have been led by Andy's passion and commitment to excellence, and will strive to carry on that

tradition in the years to come. All who are interested in reading, speaking or performing scripture, stories and theater pieces are welcome to join us!

Ushers and Communion Teams

Ushering and greeting at Bradley Hills is a service to the congregation involving security, safety, emergency procedures, medical emergencies, welcoming, and hospitality. Many of the Bradley Hills members who are health care professionals make themselves available for medical emergencies that may occur on Sunday mornings. Members and visitors alike are first received by the ushers and greeters. That first impression on a Sunday morning is important for parishioners and essential for new visitors. The PCUSA Book of Order recognizes this gathering of the people: "Worship begins as the people gather. One or more of the following actions are appropriate: People may greet one another..."

The Bradley Hills League of Ushers and Greeters assists with the gathering of the community for worship. Bradley Hills currently has 65 members serving as ushers and greeters on seven teams which rotate usher duty every seventh week. The teams are composed of church members who represent our wonderfully diverse Family of Faith with respect to gender, age, and ethnicity. We always welcome new members and encourage people to join this ministry. It is a great way to meet others in the church. Many of Bradley Hills' recent new members have joined the usher teams. The League is coordinated by two Co-Head Ushers, Susie Wellman and Corky Hickey, and a Special Services Coordinator, Carol McLeod. We offer our special appreciation to the usher team captains and assistant captains: Dave Hammers, Clarence Hickey, Susie Wellman, Lou Kallas, Andrew Milne, Louise Meyer, Joel Fickett, Sally Fowler, Bruce Hunter, and Bill Edelblut.

We are also thankful for the dedicated service of our Communion teams, who organize and prepare the very meaningful sacrament that feeds our souls. This year, Sunday communion was extended beyond the sanctuary to those in the building (including Sunday School, child care, and sextons) and to home-bound members served by the Deacons. Many thanks to the volunteers who serve in this ministry, and to Pastor David and Pastor Denise for renewing this vital aspect of worship.

The Flower Guild

PMLM's mission is to provide resources and oversee projects to maintain and improve the church facilities and grounds, negotiate agreements with building users, and support the staff that maintain the church facilities and grounds for all building users. We prioritize and align our efforts to the congregation's mission, responsible building stewardship, financial prudence, safety and earth care. PMLM oversaw a number of improvements and repairs to the building and grounds during 2023.

We augmented the rooftop solar system installed last year (which was projected to meet nearly 90% of our electrical needs) by subscribing to a community solar project. This has enabled us to meet our remaining electrical needs through solar power, at a price 10% lower than Pepco's charges per kilowatt hour.

Kim Brinkman weeding the We renovated the landscaping at the entrances to the Sanctuary, main office and choir room, replacing plantings that had outlived their

heathy life cycles and implementing a design featuring native plants intended to reduce maintenance needs over time. A dedicated group of volunteers worked throughout the year to ensure the success of the new plantings as well as maintain and improve other areas of the grounds. We had a very successful Fall Call with many members pitching in one Sunday afternoon to spread nearly 100 bags of mulch to protect our new and mature plantings from the encroaching cold weather. On the advice of a licensed arborist, we removed 10 aging trees that posed a significant risk to property users. Working with Montgomery County, however, we obtained 34 new trees to make up for that loss, which the County supplied and planted at agreed locations on our property, free of charge. We expect to receive 16 more in the coming year.

Exterior improvements to our building included installing a new sump pump and drains for the window wells outside classrooms 103, 105 and 107; recaulking all our windows; painting the

building fascia and old bell tower; replacing two old tile drains, one of which had collapsed; and repairing the roof over Covenant Hall. Interior improvements included rewiring the lights in Memorial Hall; repairing damaged pews in the Sanctuary; building out a storage closet for the Deacons; replacing the kitchen dishwasher; and painting one of the stairwells.



New Landscaping in the Spring of 2023

We continue to evaluate the safety of our congregation and building users as we explore ways to make our facilities more secure. Subcommittee worked to improve and communicate our security protocols through documentation and training sessions for deacons, ushers and building

users. We installed improved access controls at our exterior doors, funded by a grant the Nursery School received from the State of Maryland. We also worked with the Nursery School to apply for another safety grant from the state and received \$37,000 to use for additional security improvements.

As always, PMLM sought to be resourceful and spent time working with building users, local government and utilities to obtain funds that can help improve the quality and efficiency of our grounds.

Once again, our deepest gratitude goes to our building staff, Farid Beltran and the sextons for all they do day-to-day to ensure our facility and grounds provide a safe, functional and hospitable environment for our BHPC congregation, our interfaith connection to the BJC and Muslim congregations, the Nursery School and the other various groups of our community who make their home in our church.

Mission Coordination Lay Ministry

Bradley Hills has a long legacy of mission engagement. The Mission Coordination Lay Ministry spent 2023 in transition, seeking a chair and a workable model for coordinating the wide range hands-on volunteer service opportunities, peace and social justice initiatives, and overseeing the church's generous financial support for local, national, and global mission partners. Members with a heart for mission are sought to step up to lead.

Mission has several sources of funding to support a range of activities.

1) Mission allocation is nearly 6-7% of BHPC budget revenues. In 2023 that amount was \$96,279.00. MCLM chose to increase the amounts for each local mission partner by 8.7% to meet the COLA and allow for increased costs for supplies due to inflation. 2) Endowment funds were used to boost support for Faith Presbyterian Church (\$13, and New Story Leadership. For distribution of additional endowment monies available,

MCLM planned a Mission Forum on January 28, 2024, designed to offer members the opportunity to propose and vote to allocate these funds for new or existing projects. 3) Special designated

and in-kind gifts went to Angel Gift Tree recipients at Dennis Avenue Health Center and The Women's Collective, to support the annual Coat Drive and for Olive Oil ministry at the holidays (84 bottles of Palestinian olive oil for \$2747.60). 4) Alternative Giving expanded to connect with the global #GivingTuesday program and brought in \$20,995 for 16 projects.

Hands-on Projects returned to full scale operation in 2023:

• Bradley Hills sent 40 volunteers to participate in Faith Presbyterian Church's "Feeding Families" program, assembling and distributing 50 bags of free groceries 6 x per year, additionally purchased and assembled 50 bags of school supplies, and supported an annual teacher appreciation lunch with gift cards.

- The "Smart Sacks" project draws an intergenerational group of 50 volunteers, aged from 2-92, who collected food from Manna, packed, delivered and distributed 204 food sacks weekly during the school year to two elementary schools in Aspen Hill and Potomac.
- The Coat Drive distributed 108 donated coats in October to adults, children and babies through Arcola Elementary School families in Silver Spring.
- Monthly dinners were prepared for women living at Becky's Place in Rockville.
- The Interfaith Refugee Project collected furnished and equipped homes for new refugees.

MCLM also supported and coordinated efforts to support peace and social justice initiatives, and raise awareness for MCLM mission partners, including:

Supported activities of the BHPC Racial Justice Visioning Task Force.

Collaborated with the Inter-Congregational Partnership Committee (ICPC) to cosponsor a New Story Leadership (NSL) summer internship program, and to co-host an annual event in Covenant Hall on July 9 at 3:00 PM to hear the stories and share our interfaith witness with the 9 young adult in Washington for seven-week internships.

Adult Education Lay Ministry presented speakers on range of Hands-on Mission opportunities on November 12 and Alternative Giving on November 19.

Racial Justice Coordinating Committee

The Racial Justice Coordinating Committee, formed out of the 2021 Racial Justice Visioning Task Force (RJVTF), met monthly via Zoom in 2023 to review and implement actions to promote racial justice in our church, our community, our nation, and the world. This work falls under the 4 Action Pillars established by the RJVTF:

1) Action Pillar: Education of the Congregation

Planned February 5, 2023 lunch and tour of the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History & Culture, with follow up Zoom meetings to discuss personal reflections. Attendance: 19 (23 signed up)

Planned May 7 Adult Ed lecture by Jamie Ferguson, Senior Historian with The Maryland Capital Park and Planning Commission, and author of *Sharp Flashes of Lightning Come Black Clouds: The Life of Josiah Henson.* Attendance: 13 (virtually and in-person)

Planned May 21, 2023 lunch and tour of the Josiah Henson Museum & Park. Attendance: 17

Publicized informative Zooms and other educational opportunities regarding racial justice on Realm, in weekly emails, bulletins, and BHX.

Started planning for possible 2025 Civil Rights Trip to Atlanta, Birmingham, Montgomery, and Selma. Considerations include joining trip led by Westminster Presbyterian Church (Alexandria, VA).

Coordinated with Adult Education to provide speakers on Racial Justice topics: February: Rabbi Krame and LaTisha Gasaway-Paul on the history of the Scotland Community. Educated the congregation to build awareness and support for the Juneteenth Festival.

Encouraged continued Allyship training sponsored by the Presbytery through postings on Realm.

2) Action Pillar: Diversity of Staff

Pastor David Gray continued building relationships with Union Seminary and Howard Seminary.

Continued diversity in music and liturgy during worship.

3) Action Pillar: External Partnerships

Continued to deepen BHPC's two mission partnerships with Faith Presbyterian in Anacostia and Patterson Elementary School through the Mission Coordination Lay Ministry (led by Joan Burns who organizes volunteers via a Sign Up Genius):

Volunteer support of Faith's "Feeding Families" project, a food pantry offered on the 3rd Saturday of the month. BHPC sends a team of 4-5 volunteers on alternative months (6x/year) to help pack and distribute 50 bags of groceries purchased by Faith for local residents.

Financial support of Staff appreciation luncheon at Patterson Elementary and volunteer support of Patterson's school supply kit program (August 2023).

4) Action Pillar: Advocacy



Bradley Hills PC, Bethesda Jewish Congregation, and Maqaame Ibrahim Islamic Center, the three faith communities that worship at 6601 Bradley Boulevard work throughout the year to connect with one another through interfaith services and activities. This year, we organized:

- Our first Interfaith Brunch took place on the building grounds in April, with get-to-know-you activities, children's games, and a food truck.
- In July, we hosted young leaders, 5 Palestinians and 5 Israelis, from New Story Leadership to tell their powerful

personal narratives to foster peacebuilding and bring about

lasting change.

- In October, six inter-congregational authors were featured in "Authors Among Us," the fourth in the series of this program.
- The highlight of the year is the Interfaith Service, held on November 12th, followed by the all-faith communities brunch, sponsored by ICPC. The three faith communities can use a single building because we all meet at different times, so the brunch is an opportunity to meet and greet one another by inperson and by name.

The synagogue-church-mosque partnership serves members of all three faith communities. Members are encouraged to attend services of the partner congregations so that insight and understanding into the faiths of others can be made more familiar and commonalities can be found between our faiths.

Interfaith Refugee Family Initiative

Since 2016 the Interfaith Refugee Family Initiative of Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church, Bethesda Jewish Congregation, the Idara é Jaferia, the Maqaame Ibrahim Islamic Center has welcomed new refugees.

Since January 2022, we have been helping the Afghan refugee Ahmadi family (parents, 2 daughters in their 20s in cooperation with their resettlement agency, Lutheran Social Services. The initial commitment, including rent support, was for one year. The family continues to live in the apartment in Silver Spring that we (BHPC being the leasee) rented for them in 2022, paying their rent on time. The lease was transferred to the family in April of 2023. We continue to provide support with navigating benefits and finances, transportation to medical appointments for the disabled daughter, set up and accompany

her to some appointments, paid for an assessment to help her get an appropriate job and training and eventually social security benefits. She continues to receive tutoring and mentoring by our volunteers. Two retired lawyers (both BJC members) spent numerous hours preparing the family for their asylum application and interviews. Asylum was was recently granted to the family and they can apply for a green card within 12 months. Both parents have full time jobs and transitioned from night to day shift; one daughter works part-time with increasing responsibilities, and serves as the family's manager.

We also started to support Mehria Reshta, a young Afghan woman who came to the US without her family, helping her with her apartment set up, benefits, medical appointments, transportation, job search and application to college. The Yousufi family, whom we started serving in 2017reaches out as needed. The wife, got her citizenship, started a job, and passed the written test for her learner's permit. The husband got promoted to maintenance work within the MCPS.

We continue to collect household items for apartment set ups. Several in our group volunteer with HomesNotBorders, setting up apartments for recently arrived refugees.

There are currently 13 volunteers, 4 from BHPC, who served as needed.

Financial: We started the year with \$14,678 and currently have a balance of \$9663.

We mourn the passing of Marty Ganzglass who has been a steadfast and joyful member of our group all these years.

Friends Club

Friends Club has been meeting three days per week at almost full capacity throughout 2023. There continues to be a demand for our program. Currently, we have a "wait list" and as spaces become available, they are filled quickly. This year we added a new activities coordinator who has introduced new ideas and programs to Friends Club. Although we do not have the infrastructure in place (yet) it is still our intent to add a fourth day to our schedule. In the meantime, we have introduced "Drop-In" Tuesdays. This is a modified day for a smaller group of members. One of the most significant additions to our programming is the inclusion of the Arts for the Aging—a nonprofit that provides innovative arts programming—music and visual. This addition has been well received by our members, volunteers, and caregivers. The caregiver support group continues to provide a supportive environment for current and former caregivers. They continue to meet twice monthly. Friends Club experienced two significant losses in 2023. We learned that one of our cofounders, Molly Tully passed away and one of our most beloved volunteers and board member, Marty Ganzglass passed away very unexpectedly. Both will have a forever lasting impact on Friends Club. As we continue to recruit new volunteers, we were able to add three new volunteers. This is an ongoing process. Friends Club provides a social program designed to enhance the lives of men living with Dementia and other memory loss. We also provide respite for their caregivers.

Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church Nursery School



BHPCNS is a preschool program for children ages 2 through 5, located on the lower level of the BHPC building. Since the school's founding in 1957, by BHPC members, BHPCNS has grown to its current size of more than 170 students, 37 teachers, and an administrative staff of 5. With an annual budget of over \$1.3 million, the school contributes in ways large and small to the BHPC community. The school pays an annual user fee to BHPC, which is approximately 12% of the school's budget. In addition to the user fee, BHPCNS maintains

the playgrounds, contributes to landscaping, and pays for other building improvements. The most recent enhancement has been the addition of new sinks and floors in the lower-level bathrooms.

BHPCNS believes children through play, learn friendship, social, and emotional skills, independence, developmentally age-appropriate

cognitive concepts, how to work cooperatively in a group setting, and to be good citizens. Daily the children are exposed to art, music, science, creative movement, literature, math, and many other experiential learning opportunities.

In addition to our classroom teachers' fun and engaging classroom schedules, we work with magical specialists who supplement our programming with Music, Art, Science, and American Sign Language for the children. Throughout the school day our hallways, classrooms, and outdoor play spaces are filled with children's voices, laughter, and excitement.

BHPCNS has a continuing partnership with Growing Minds, a therapeutic center for children and their families, to support our staff in meeting the unique needs of the children in our program. This collaboration includes classroom observations, meetings with staff and families, parent education coffees, and therapeutic supplemental programming for children as needed.

During the 2022-2023 school year, BHPCNS provided need-based scholarships totaling \$40,420 providing 7 children the opportunity to be a part of the school community.

Invitations to family-friendly activities offered by BHPC and by the BHPCNS are jointly extended to the BHPC and school community.

The success of BHPCNS is attributed to the dedication of our amazing staff, the support of our parents, our specialists, and the support of Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church. Thank you.
