- Seeing a Healing and Wholeness service from 2000, as many of us revere our Blue Christmas services now.
- A youth Easter vigil, waiting all night for the sun to rise on Easter morning in 2001.
- To see sacred friends read scripture together in 1999.
- To be reminded the time in the early 2000s, when I first met Susan Andrews.
- To celebrate God Squad, Daybreak Devotions, and supper on Maundy Thursday.
- To be inspired by the Bethesda Christmas Carol Sing, what a good idea!
- To see how Taizé worship was conducted in 2002, and what Pentecost was like in 1989.
- To marvel at Christmas communion in 1988, at informal worship services years ago, and at the Covenant Hall dedication in May 2002.
- To see how all church picnics and music celebrations were conducted in the mid '90s.

Maybe you participated in some of these activities? I'd love to hear your stories about them. Or see the pictures. Or learn of other ideas of things we used to do, as we celebrate our history, leading up to our May 3 dinner.

As we begin Lent, we will be looking at Paul's letter to the Philippines in worship and reflecting on our spiritual journey. That might take some of us back to activities of the past. Or propel us to think about the legacy we leave for the future. For this month is also a time for celebrating what a vibrant future we have at BHPC. We have between one and three baptisms four Sundays in March. We have confirmation Sunday March 16, when up to 20 of our youth will join the church. And Youth Sunday is March 30, where youth lead worship. The future is bright at BHPC.

We have a rich and special history here at Bradley Hills. One worth preserving. We are grateful for our present. It was five years ago this month when Covid started. We made it through that. We have come a long way as a congregation. God is good. We are excited for the future. The God who has been our God in ages past is still here and will be our God for ages to come. Thanks be to God. # Stewardship



## A Word from the Stewardship Lay Ministry

All year we write and talk to you about “stewardship.” We thank you for your good “stewardship” when you set another record (as you did again this year!) for pledged contributions in the year ahead. We urge you to be good “stewards” when we ask for pledges again in the fall. And our lay ministry goes by the name “stewardship.” But we don’t often stop to think about everything that “stewardship” means.

It certainly includes generous giving. Whether you give to meet general needs in the church or to support a favorite church ministry, the church depends on your generosity to heat the sanctuary and fill it with music and light, to pay our talented and dedicated staff, and to carry out the missions that share God’s love with our neighbors and the world around us.

But the root of the word “stewardship” runs deeper. A “steward” is a servant who is trusted with the assets of a household or an enterprise and is given the responsibility of managing them. In this case, we are God’s stewards and we have been trusted with – in the simplest term – everything. Psalm 24 opens with the familiar phrase, “The earth is the Lord’s, and all that is in it.” Everything we have was a gift from God, from the earliest creation of the earth, to our strength, intelligence, and professional talents, up to the groceries we bought yesterday.

The essence of stewardship is to make wise use of all those gifts, and to give back what we can to God and the church out of the abundance that God has given us. “All shall give as they are able, according to the blessing that the Lord your God has given you.” Deuteronomy 16:17. “For all things come from Thee, and of Thine own have we given Thee.” 1 Chronicles 29:14.

As the old hymn rephrases this scripture:

We give Thee but Thine own,  
Whate’er the gift may be;  
All that we have is Thine alone,  
A trust, O Lord, from Thee.

The same is true of the intangible gifts God has given us. Good stewards offer their time and talents to teach children or share knowledge or insight with adults, to sing or play music, to provide leadership or to minister to those who need support, encouragement, or companionship. We don’t all have the same talents, but God has distributed a variety of talents among us, and we are called upon to use those that we have for the church’s good. “Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received.” 1 Peter 4:10.

That is why your Stewardship Lay Ministry regularly thanks you, not only for your financial gifts, but for your time and talent and your dedication to serving others within the church.

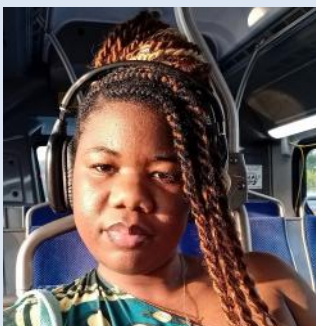

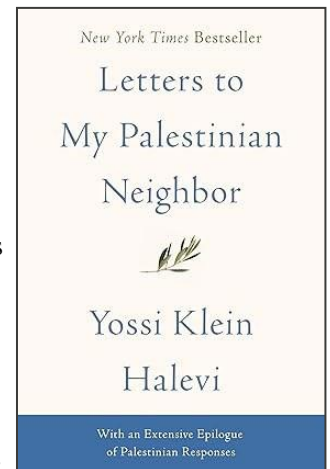

## Special Interfaith Book Discussion May 13 | 7-8:30 pm

The next InterCongregational Partnership Committee (ICPC) book discussion will be about *Letters to My Palestinian Neighbor*, a New York Times best seller by Yossi Klein Halevi. The in-person discussion will be held Tuesday May 13, 2025, in Covenant Hall from 7-8:30 pm. The author writes a series of letters to unspecified Palestinians to explain why Israel matters to him and the Jewish people, and why it's so hard to make peace even when folks want it. Mr. Halevi is upfront with his readers, sharing that he is representing his personal Jewish point of view but wishes to engage in a real dialogue. Originally published in 2018, the second edition (2019) includes responses from Palestinian and other Arab readers. Please read the second edition if possible. This ICPC event is sponsored by BHPC, Bethesda Jewish Congregation (BJC), and Maqaame Ibrahim Islamic Center (MIIC), all congregations that worship at 6601 Bradley Boulevard. **March 2 and 9: Denise Dombkowski Hopkins, PhD,** Professor Emerita of Hebrew Bible, Wesley Theological Seminary, *The Book of Lamentations: Hope for a Fragmented Community Then and Now?* In two sessions, we will explore the short, five-chapter book of Lamentations to uncover how it weaves together the voices of individual suffering to shape collective unity and identity in the aftermath of the trauma of the Babylonian exile. Its process prompts us to ask whether we in the US can follow a similar process to create shared memory in the midst of our current fragmentation.

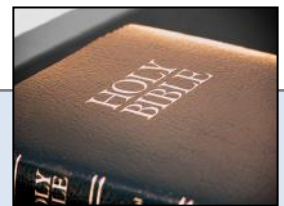
**March 16: Vision and Understanding as a Response to Volatility and Uncertainty.** This will be a facilitated open forum discussion to process the uncertainty of our current times. How do we process the last 90 days of volatile change and loss?

- > What spiritual practices and readings are helping you manage your response to these changes?
- > How are we providing community to each other?
- > What are ways we can support each other, especially those in our community who may be facing job loss?
- > How can we provide safety, support, and care to vulnerable members of our community, especially immigrants and LGBTQ+ community members?

Participants will be able to engage securely within our community, both in person and remotely. This session will not be recorded.

**March 23: Karl Klontz,** a physician-epidemiologist with forty years' experience working for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, will update the status of avian influenza ("Bird flu"). During a career focused on infectious diseases, Klontz has cultured the sewers of Miami for cholera, bled birds for encephalitis-causing viruses, served a sabbatical in Bangladesh at the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research (icDDR,b), and investigated multi-state and international infectious disease outbreaks. For seventeen years, he also lectured part-time as a professor of epidemiology at The George Washington University School of Public Health. His presentation on bird flu will focus on the history and present status of avian influenza viruses and their pandemic potential.

**March 30: Jean Dudek** will discuss two biblical books named for their female protagonists: Esther and Judith. The book of Esther just barely made it into the Hebrew Bible canon; the book of Judith did not, but is included in the Apocrypha. These two short novels include themes of identity, survival, political engagement, and more. You do not need to read the books in order to attend the session. (But frankly, they might be more fun than whatever else you're reading.) Jean Dudek graduated from Wesley Theological Seminary with a Master of Theological Studies degree, with a concentration in biblical studies. She serves as a Teaching Assistant at Wesley in the introductory Bible classes. Jean is a member of the Network of Biblical Storytellers, International. Her first novel, *The Scent of Bright Light*, re-tells the story of Sarah, Abraham, and Hagar from Sarah's point of view.
