

Nurturing our Spiritual Life

Summer is often a time when I'm able to refocus my prayer life in preparation for the year to come. As I've been in prayer these last few weeks, I've been reflecting on four things about our human condition. One is that we each have a spiritual core. A soul. A part of us that connects deeply with God and is our most authentic self. Secondly, that we all face challenges. These last few weeks I've been caring for my father and helping our family in Ohio navigate some choppy waters regarding the future. Third, that we have a God, who loves us dearly. That God who created us, sustains us during those challenges and, ultimately, redeems us, bringing us back to God's self. Fourth, that such knowledge can give us hope.

We are all soulful creatures. That means that we are spiritual beings. Saint Augustine wrote that we are ultimately restless until we find our rest in God. Along with the Psalmist, I affirm that we yearn for the living God. As we navigate the world around us, we each have the opportunity to allow the Spirit to draw us closer to the living God.

A few weeks ago, I sat alone in a chapel, to pray. I read the popular Psalm 42, as I often do. It honors the soulfulness of each of us. But I read a bit further that morning. To Psalm 43. It's a Psalm that honors the challenges of life. When I came to its conclusion, I saw that the ending of Psalm 43 lifts up the four points I had been reflecting upon. That we have a soul. That we have challenges. That we have God. That such knowledge can give us hope.

The Psalmist asks, "Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise God, my Savior and my God." I have been praying that phrase the last few weeks. And it has given me hope.

We have accomplished a lot together at BHPC over the

last year, especially in the first part of 2026. We moved forward on our strategic plan's "steward and celebrate" goals in significant ways. We are well

positioned as we move into the future as a result. This program year we will return to the other three goals of our strategic plan. As we seek to connect, serve and nurture. We will be exploring, during this next year, ways we may connect our gifts to God's church. We will seek to expand the avenues and opportunities through which we can serve the world. And I hope that this fall you'll join us as we seek to nurture our spiritual lives. Our souls are called to magnify the Lord through worship, and we'll do that as we return to our beautiful sanctuary with our new floor.

You'll see in this newsletter ways to get more involved in deepening your spiritual life. We have been given the word of God as a gift. We invite you to Bible study, and to read the word of God as you seek to strengthen your spiritual life. I love praying the prayer chain that Pastor Denise carefully puts together. I have found that praying the prayer chain is a deeply spiritual activity. It allows us to realize that while we all have challenges, that we all also have a soul and a God who loves us and walks with us towards hope.

As the fall begins and so many of our programs get going once more, see what calls to you. See where God may be calling you to honor your soul and enrich your spiritual life this fall at Bradley Hills. I look forward to walking alongside you, and to seeing you at church.

Adult Education - September

September 13 | Courtney Shea, NBC News Election Night Analyst, Senior Vice President at Ipsos, and a dedicated Bradley Hills member, will address how news organizations cover U.S. elections. She will provide a behind-the-scenes look at how major news organizations use exit polling to explain vote results on election night. She will also discuss how news organizations determine the winner of races while votes are still being counted.

September 20, 27, and October 4 | Dr. R. Bruce Douglass (and close friend of Bradley Hills,) Director Emeritus, Reformed Institute of Metropolitan Washington and former Chair of the Department of Government at Georgetown University will be presenting a three-part series:

REFORMED POLITICAL THOUGHT IN THE “POSTIST” ERA

In the aftermath of World War II, Reformed Protestants participated actively in the creation of a world that departed dramatically from the one they had previously known in a number of notable respects. The colonial empires the European powers had created in other parts of the world were successfully challenged and overcome, for example, and that created a whole new set of geopolitical dynamics. So did the rise of the new Communist “bloc” in Europe—and beyond. Not only did this lead to a military standoff that lasted for decades, but it also gave rise to a global ideological struggle that left few countries unaffected. As Europe recovered from the devastation the Great Depression and the war had inflicted on it, moreover, it was not long before most of the affected nations achieved dynamic industrial economies that delivered unprecedented prosperity.

This economic “miracle” happened elsewhere in the industrialized world (including the USA) and once that happened, it was not long before the whole “developed” world began moving in a “post-industrial” direction. And

with that came an ongoing series of changes in the way of life of those nations that over time distanced them ever further from the one the post-war generation had known. They departed so much from the way of life they had inherited, in fact, that there was even talk of the coming of a “post-modern” era.

These developments presented political challenges that were in some ways formidable as the ones the industrial era had brought. They prompted a rethinking of certain important themes in the Reformed political tradition by its adherents that brought yet another new chapter in its development. Though the figures who took part in this rethinking were inclined to build on the foundation laid by their industrial era predecessors (such as Karl Barth and Reinhold Niebuhr), it soon became evident that they needed to break fresh ground if they were to address the challenges of their own day effectively.

- **September 20** | Decolonization and the rise of the “Third World”
- **September 27** | The triumph of “liberal” democracy
- **October 4** | Secularization

Dr. Douglass never fails to enlighten and remind us about how our faith has addressed the challenges of the past and the similarities and differences to those of today.

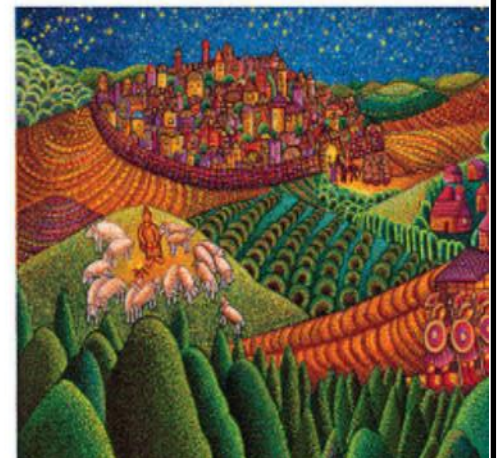

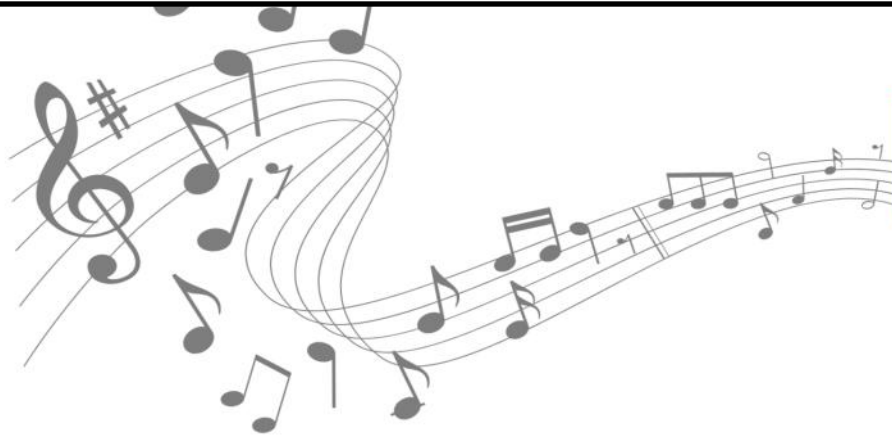

COMING SOON: THE FALL STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

Every September, the Stewardship Lay Ministry gives the congregation a preview of our upcoming fall stewardship campaign. This year, we have an especially important story to tell.

In October, we will launch our 2027 campaign, **“We Belong Here.”** As always, we will invite everyone to prayerfully consider what they can pledge to support the BHPC operating budget in the year ahead.

But this year is different.

Not long ago, BHPC launched **“Here for Good” (HFG)**, an ambitious capital campaign to strengthen our church for generations to come. You responded with extraordinary generosity, pledging more than **\$5 million**. And you have already contributed more than **\$1.3 million** of those pledges.

So you may be wondering: *What now? Are you really coming back to us so soon asking for more?*

The answer is yes - but for a very different purpose.

Our fall stewardship campaign supports the **BHPC operating budget** for the coming year. That budget makes possible so much of what happens here every day: it supports our dedicated staff, keeps our building operating, funds programs that educate and inspire us, and provides the bulk of our financial support for mission partners. Those needs—and opportunities—will continue.

But **HFG changes the picture in important ways.**

In recent years, the Finance Lay Ministry has transferred more than \$50,000 annually from the operating budget to the capital reserve to pay for maintenance and improvements to our building and grounds. When the church finished a year with a surplus, those funds often went to the capital reserve as well.

Thanks to your generosity through HFG, we no longer expect to need that annual transfer.

Approximately **20% of HFG contributions will go directly into the capital reserve**. This year, those funds have already helped pay for the new Sanctuary floor, and they will soon help fund needed repairs to our organ and upgrades to our audiovisual system.

Even more significant, approximately **75% of HFG contributions will establish the Todd McCreight Building Endowment Fund**. These funds will be carefully invested, with the annual investment income directed to the capital reserve. Conservative projections give us reason to believe that this income can meet our ongoing maintenance and improvement needs indefinitely.

And there is another exciting possibility.

The remaining HFG contributions will enhance our mission expenditures, including our efforts to address food insecurity—support that goes beyond what the annual operating budget can provide.

That means your generosity through HFG doesn't simply solve today's needs. It helps change what will be possible tomorrow.

Beginning in 2027, we expect that operating-budget contributions will no longer need to cover those capital needs. Instead, more of the operating budget can be devoted to what happens at the heart of BHPC: **more and better programs and services for our congregation, and greater support for our mission partners.**

So yes, we will ask you to give again this fall. But we do so with a new sense of possibility.
